"Especially pleasing is the fact that the senior leadership of Marine Corps Public Affairs will be joining us again this year," Flash said. He also said that CCHQ has been informed that the Marketing and Public Affairs Marines from the Marine Corps Recruiting Command will again be in attendance.

## State of the Association-2008

As we close another successful calendar year we offer the following accomplishments from 2008 and where we hope to be heading in 2009.

First, our finances. Borrowing from the late **Bob** "**Mo" Morrisey** and, more recently from our own national Treasurer, **Tom Kerr**: "We ain't broke." Yes, we are definitely concerned with the sad state of the national economy and will be working diligently with our new Foundation Board to see that we survive. Fortunately, we run a bare-bones operation so major cutbacks are not as necessary as they are with some veterans organizations. Here are some other 2008 highlights:

Since 2005 we have seen the number of **Merit Awards sponsorships** increase from single digits to 35 in 2008. Obviously, this helps our financial picture. In 2009 we hope to add 10 more sponsorships.

The **Booster Club** has 17 members at this writing. We need more.

Advertising increased in the **2008 Annual Conference Journal** thanks to the great work of Art Director **Chuck Beveridge**. Both our members and our corporate partners recognize the Journal as a professional "book." Our membership is supporting it with their quarter-page (and larger) ads but, even with a profit in 2008, we need more corporate support.

While we had to cut some unresponsive memberships, we managed to bring on board 40 new members in 2008. We end 2008 at 483 members. The concern is that our Honorary and Life members represent approximately 55% of our membership. We have a ready source at the website <a href="https://www.togetherweserved">www.togetherweserved</a>. There are more than 500 present and former CCs listed as well as 400+members of the 4600 field. If you have not visited the site we encourage you to use it as a recruiting tool. Our realistic goal for 2009 is 75 new members.

Through the efforts of many at **DINFOS**, we are seeing graduates now accepting the complimentary memberships we offer. We use the word "accept" as we now require the graduate to activate his or her membership by contacting CCHQ.

Thanks to the top-down encouragement from **Division of Public Affairs** to field commands, we now are seeing many repeat registrations at our annual Conference. This means we now can place faces with names with these new breed CCs. Likewise, they are able to get better exposure to us. This has to pay future dividends from a membership standpoint.

Our relationship with DivPA at HQMC has never been better. The Public Affairs Chief, MGySgt. Phil Mehringer is a Life Member and one of our most ardent boosters. Unlike Macy not talking to Gimble, CCHQ speaks to the DivPA staff at least once per week.

In 2009 we are going to attempt a re-write of **Gary Cameron's Last to Know, First to Go.** We have a willing editor and will be asking all CCs for their remembrances of events from the 1970's onward.

Our newly-launched national website **www.usmccca.org** is certainly one of the yearend highlights. What a great job **Kate Stark** has done in a short time! In 2009 we look for the site to be more inter-active with members being able to have dialogue with one another and with members able to use the site for conference registration and the paying of dues.

In December, right on new Foundation President Don O'Neal's target, we split the Foundation from the Association, re-wrote the bylaws, elected new officers and now expect big things. We did this to protect the Association from violations that could affect our non-profit status. Our concern was/is that we keep the Foundation under the control of our membership. All current Association Directors automatically become Directors in the Foundation although none of the present officers can hold dual offices. You can read about the new Foundation board in Don's column on page 5

Finally, with the leadership of **Fred "Flash" Lash** at the Association and the new Foundation **President, Don O'Neal**, we can look forward to a prosperous (and happy) New Year.

### Versatile Website Offers Various Member Options


Yes, we're excited about our new national website www.usmccca.org!

Prospective members can now join us by completing the on-line **Membership Application**. Members can also **renew** their memberships. **Conference Registration** is now up. PayPal is acknowledged to be the safest way to handle credit card payments and we now offer it to you. Enjoy.

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To begin with, your Prez has now taken up residence in the Department of State and works for the Press Secretary. Up until the 16<sup>th</sup> of January, it was Sean McCormack; however, with the advent of a new administration coming in on the 20<sup>th</sup>, he will depart and I'll get a few new bosses (including a new Secretary of State!).

Having heard this, we immediately went into action, meeting first with the Div PA leadership (including Colonel Lapan, LtCol Matt McLaughlin, MGvSgt Phil Mehringer, and MSgt Kyle Olson), then with a selection of young Marines (both in Div PA and at the Defense Information School), asking them what would be some of the activities we could possibly arrange that would tempt them to remain in the hotel on Tuesday and Wednesday nights during the conference, instead of going out on liberty. By and large, they seemed to favor karaoke and a DJ with music. So, we've now arranged to have both during that week, thus providing some great entertainment for our hard chargers, both young and old (I personally love singing in karaoke contests, and I also sense that **Joanne Schilling Peck** will also be willing to cut loose with some tunes!).

The bottom line to this discourse is this—I'm asking each of you to put on your creativity hats and come up with a few more fun activities that we can employ in Hampton, that'll ensure the most attendance by the Marines who will have traveled a long way to be there and are always looking for ways to 'blow off steam.' Should you have talent as a magician, stand-up comic, musician, or game show host, let us know and we'll look at putting you to work in Hampton.

Whereas some other venues (like next year in Reno) may not require such activities in the hotel, we've come to the conclusion that this one certainly does, thus the efforts to put together an appealing package to both attract more commands to send their Marines and also keep them in the hotel while they're present

### Col. James W. "Wes" Hammond

(Ed. Note: At NHT press time we were notified of the death of CC Wes Hammond)

USMCCCA member, Colonel James W. (Wes) Hammond, Jr. USMC (Ret.) passed away on January 14, 2009 in Reno, NV with his family at his side. He was born March 6, 1929 in New York City.

Upon graduating from the U.S. Naval Academy in 1951, the former enlisted Leatherneck was commissioned in the Marine Corps. During 25 years of service, he fought in Korea and Vietnam and was assigned to posts from Hawaii, to Washington, to Camp Lejeune.

He commanded the famed "Magnificent Bastards" in Vietnam, turning the battalion over to Lt. Col. P. X. Kelley when Hammond was wounded in combat and forced to evacuate. Later, he was editor of the Marine Corps Gazette at a time when the Marine Corps Association filled many of its Gazette and Leatherneck billets with active duty members.

In 1959 he married the former Donna Selby. He retired from active duty in 1975 and moved to Reno.



Ronna, is an active duty gunnery sergeant, serving at DivPA following completion of the photojournalist course at Syracuse University. She served in Operation

Iraqi Freedom and wrote articles for the Association newsletter while deployed.

We have elected **John Dodd**, who serves on the DINFOS staff, as our treasurer and Victoria Turney as our secretary. Victoria is currently director, marketing and corporate relations for Prime Power Services, Inc. To round out our team we have elected former CC president Red Carpenter, Leatherneck Publisher/Editor Walt Ford, and Agostino VonHassel to the board. Past president Keith Oliver joins us as an ex officio board member.

This team brings experience and continuity while also providing a infusion of youth and enthusiasm that will help us better understand and address the needs of the Association's "tribal elders" as well as those of today's active duty CCs.

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### CC's Mourn Poos, Marth, Powell, McEwen

**Robert Poos**, who covered the Vietnam War as a reporter for the Associated Press and later served as managing editor for the outspokenly pro-military magazine Soldier of Fortune, has died at age 78. Poos died in mid-December at a hospice in Arlington, Va., where he had been under care for nearly two years for respiratory ailments, his wife, Bobbie Poos, said. He recently had suf-

fered a broken hip and a broken elbow in falls.

Born in Hillsboro, Ill., on July 12, 1930, Poos was the son of Omer Poos, a U.S. District Court Judge in Springfield, Ill. In early years, he knocked about as a coal miner, merchant seaman and deckhand on a Mississippi river boat before joining the Marines at the outset of the Ko-

rean War in 1950. In 1951 he was among the

"Frozen Chosin" Marines who staged a fighting winter retreat from the Chosin Reservoir, under attack by Chinese Communist forces who had entered the way and reservoir.

Poos joined the AP as a newsman in St. Louis, Mo., in 1957 after journalism studies at Southern Illinois University and working as a reporter-photographer for the Southern Illinoisan newspaper in Carbondale, Ill.

In 1965, he was assigned to the AP's Saigon bureau and quickly became noted for aggressive and daring combat reporting. During the January 1966 battle of An Thi, where U.S. cavalry troops were surrounded by communist forces, Poos and AP photographer Henri Huet helped recover and stand guard over wounded GIs. (By Richard Pyle, AP, NY)

It is also with great sadness that we have learned of the passing of **CC Life member Rudy Marth** on January 9 in Woodbridge, VA. Marth, both a motion picture and still photographer in the Marine Corps, was a retired Gunnery Sergeant who later became a film editor and worked for Capitol Films. He was interred at the National Cemetery at Quantico. He is survived by his wife, Dorothy and three sons, Mark, Kirk and Scott.

CC **Bob Powell** died Oct. 19, 2008 in Mechanicsville, Va. A WWII veteran who was recalled to active duty to train Korea-bound Marines at Camp Lejeune, he earned a Silver Star and two Bronze Star Medals during fighting in the Pacific.

An associate member since the 1980s, Bob was also active in the Marine Corps League and as a leader at Fairmount Christian Church in Mechanics-

ville. His business, Tru-View Presentations, took him all over the country giving multimedia patriotic programs at public schools, veterans' homes and military venues including Parris Island and the Naval Academy. He would typically dress in the persona of "The Old Timer," a vintage cowboy with authentic Winchester rifle. He also appeared as an American Revolutionary soldier or a WWII U. S. Marine, wearing the same herringbone utilities he was issued as an Old China Hand.

Mary Carter McEwen, 84, wife of two-time CC President Bob McEwen, died December 12 in Indian Shores, FL following a series of health problems over the past three years. She met Bob while employed at the USNH Great Lakes where the then SSgt. McEwen was stationed. They married in 1956. She is survived by Bob and two children

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## A Lighter Side of the late LtGen. Krulak

Some time ago **Tony Scaran** sent us Lt. Gen. **Victor** "**Brute**" **Krulak's** farewell luncheon remarks as he prepared to relinquish his FMFPac command in 1968. Ironically, the General died in December before we could use it. Tony explains his relationship with the legendary Marine.:

"I became the "acting" ISO at FMFPac while ISO at Kaneohe Bay. **Jim Williams** was on his way to Vietnam so General Krulak 'volunteered' me to drive from KBay to Makalapa and back each day. This went on for 11 weeks. The speech he made at the luncheon shows he was 'on' that day. Many, many laughs which most of us thought were never possible."

#### Lt. Gen. Krulak's Farewell Luncheon Remarks

"Gentlemen: A light word on luncheons. I have been the bull of the woods in this headquarters as I've been in FMFPac longer than most of you. That's not as important

as the fact that I have gone through more stuffed tomatoes than the rest of you including one stuffed with lobster that cost \$3 a copy.

"I am grateful for my plaque...and remember the large number that have been passed out to some of the finest people who have worn the Marine uniform."

Then, speaking of statistics and the likelihood of all in the room attaining the rank of general, he said "whether or not you do, remember the story of the young Marine who told a buddy 'the thing I hate about generals is they don't have any guts.' His friend replied: 'Have you looked at one sideways recently.'

Then Krulak remarked: "Well, it isn't just Generals who have guts. It's everybody in the Marines and I expect you to take that seriously in its most profound sense.


"Unless you have them, (guts) unless you exert them and make yourself felt, unless you are really a performer, unless you become involved, the Marine Corps won't be able to make it because its survival is dependent upon the involvement of the well dedicated, thoroughly knowledgeable people such as you."

"I would acknowledge at the outset that this is indeed an organization-men era where the premium is placed on the individual who avoids involvement, who avoids taking a stand.

"You would never believe it possible that one could get to

the exalted rank of lieutenant general having made all of the mistakes I made.

"I was ill-starred from the beginning. The day I was due to be commissioned, 25 of us lined up but only 24 were commissioned – I was the last one as they could not find my credentials. The 24 were commissioned

"I put in a claim for that one day's pay in 1960 and I got a growl on the phone from General Shoup.

"He thought I was crazy, asking for that day's pay of a second

lieutenant plus 6% interest compounded for 30 years. I didn't give a damn what he thought. I knew I was right and I stood up for it. I haven't gotten the money. Lots of mistakes...

"Could you make lieutenant general with a reprimand on your record? I have one. The JAG reprimanded me for running into a train in my private car. I was a second lieutenant at the Philadelphia Navy Yard and officer of the Day.

"In those days you didn't get a sedan to inspect sentries or even a pickup truck; they issued you a bicycle. Well, it was snowing, about a foot on the ground and you had to wear your sword with this bicycle. I elected to use my brandnew Ford convertible for which I owed a sou or two.

"As I was crossing the railroad track with no chains on my tires, I got stuck on the track and got out to go and get help. Much to my consternation, I saw a train coming and I stood there, complete with sword and watched the train hit my brand new car, dragging it way up the track."

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## 2009 Merit Awards Program Kicks-off

Hundreds of submissions in the 2009 USMCCCA Merit Awards program are being screened and assembled at the Division of Public Affairs, Marine Corps headquarters, Pentagon.

With a deadline of February 16 the entries were still pouring in at press time for NHT. Another record breaking year in terms of volume in the print, broadcast and photographic competitions may be in the making, says **MGySgt. Phil Mehringer**, chief of Marine Corps public affairs and liaison to the association.

His headquarters team for the project includes **GySgt**. **Ronna Weyland**, **GySgt**. **Steve Williams (Marines TV)**, **Sgt. Clinton Firstbrook and LCpl. Bryan Carfrey. Association Awards Chair Don Knight** met with several members of the team at the National Press Club in December to discuss the recruitment of judges, a judging venue in Washington, D.C. on March 5 and 6, and the presentation of awards at the 2009 Annual Conference of the USMCCCA at Hampton, VA in September.

The Merit Awards program reached record dimensions in 2008 with more than one thousand submissions in 47 categories. At San Antonio last year there were 133 presentations of plaques and certificates, including the first and second place and honorable mentions in the Merit Award competition. Included were awards to seven Marines in marketing and public affairs from the recruiting command; three Leatherneck magazine awards and the Association's Denig, Dickson and Presidential awards.

A lineup of 25 civilian judges brought an extraordinary range of experience and talent to the judging process last year. One panel of six professional photographers worked long into the evening at the Pentagon to review hundreds of entries in the photo competition. The broadcast judges took three days to review tape and film submitted in the many broadcast categories.

The use of civilian judges with extensive backgrounds in journalism and public affairs puts a stamp of legitimacy on the awards program. The judges, in turn, say they are impressed with what they read, watch and hear during the many hours of volunteer duty.

Each judge was asked last year to submit a personal critique on the awards program.

One print judge, **Richard Truitt** of Rowayton, CT, is a former Marine platoon leader in the Korean conflict. He is also a former Chicago Tribune reporter, a Presidential

speech writer, author and a journalism teacher at Northwestern and New York Universities who has also run two global public relations firms, He summarized his one full day of judging at the Pentagon:

"In the best stories the use of quotes and attribution was sound and inventive and some of the leads were spectacular...I thought the categories were fine and that the cheerful help of the staff made for a stimulating and happy day."

And speaking of professional involvement, after all of the work by the Marine combat correspondents, by the head-quarters staff and the judges there has to be a fitting climax. Enter **Patrick Coulter**, the voice of Raytheon and the voice of the merit awards program. Coulter, a former Marine CC, will return as master of ceremonies for the awards banquet at the Hampton conference in September. "The awards banquet represents a proud moment for these talented Marines," he says. "It's also a proud moment for our association and for the United States Marine Corps."

### New Dale Dye Book Out


In addition to spending most of 2008 out of country working on a war series for HBO, Dale Dye has found time to pen his latest adventure novel "Laos File."

I am hoping that your members might be able to provide me with some information on both Sgt White and Mr. Hillan. I would very much like to have more of the story before I put the cameras on display.
