CC Mark J. Dysart, 57, Windsor, CT died Sunday, April 24. He grew up in a military family




that took him all over the world, and he later served during the Vietnam War. During his years with the Marine Corps,



Merit Judge: "Darn Good Subject Matter"

Start with about **1,500 entries**. Assemble 10 professional civilian judges. Add 40 hours of judging over 3 days, then announce the winners in more than 40 categories involving photography, print journalism, videography and radio.

That's the recipe for another **Merit Awards Program**, a joint effort by the USMCCCA and the U.S. Marine Corps. The final scenario will unfold on a hotel ballroom stage at New Orleans in September, when active duty Marines, most of them combat correspondents, step forth to claim their awards for tasks well done.

Col. Brian Salas, director of public affairs, Marine Corps, visited the judges on the final day of deliberations and presented them certificates of appreciation from **Gen. James F. Amos**, Marine Commandant, for their volunteer work as judges in the annual Merit Awards competition.

Lou Priebe was a newcomer among the judging panels. He brought a long and productive career as an awardwinning writer and public relations executive in Washington, D.C. to the judging of print entries. "Darn good subject matter, a really interesting day," he said.

He was especially impressed with entries from the Marine base newspapers. **"They really tell what's going on, not only on base but in the neighboring communities," Priebe**, a former Army infantryman, added: "I'm ready to help the Marines anytime."

Denig Winner CC Jim Lehrer Honored

Former Marine Jim Lehrer, the USMCCCA 2007 Brig. Gen. Robert L. Denig award winner, has done it again. Lehrer, who has set a standard of broadcast excellence at

PBS for more than 35 years, has been selected as the winner of the National Press Club's 2011 Fourth Estate Award, the highest honor presented by the world's leading professional organization for journalists.

"Jim Lehrer has embodied the time-tested core values of journalism dating back to when many people had only black and white screens

and continuing through today's era of high definition television and social media," said Club President Mark Hamrick, after the Club's Board of Governors chose Lehrer for the honor. "Amid the cacophony of a sometimes shrill media landscape, he has remained the true voice of reason, balance and fairness."

Previous award winners include Walter Cronkite, Christiane Amanpour and David Broder. Hamrick said the selection of Lehrer was in keeping with that tradition. Lehrer has moderated 11 debates over the course of the past six presidential elections.

After an early career in newspapers he entered the Marine Corps in the mid 1950s and, prior to his discharge in 1958 he served as Officer In Charge of the Parris Island BOOT Newspaper. Lehrer joined a public television station in Dal-

Jack Pulwers Dies in VA

Longtime CC supporter, Jack Pulwers, Ph.D. of Fairfax, VA died March 29, 2011 at Fair Oaks Hospital of extended illness after congestive heart failure.

Born in New York City on July 2, 1924, Jack was raised there and in Shreveport, Louisiana. He received double degrees from Louisiana State University and a Ph.D. with distinction from Catholic University. He was a distinguished historian, journalist and author. He maintained a long career in network radio and as Broadcast Chief in the Armed Services Radio and Television Service, and authored several acclaimed books, including The Press of Battle, on WWII.

He was interred April 6 at Quantico National Cemetery.

las and later moved to PBS in Washington, where he first appeared as Washington correspondent on the Robert McNeil Report in 1975. A year later the show was renamed "The McNeil/Lehrer Report," and began to amass a remarkable record of achievement.

The room fee is \$98 plus tax per night. Please understand that we have booked a certain amount of rooms at this rate. When the agreed upon number is exceeded the rate could go up or the hotel might have to make arrangements with another hotel at a different rate.

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
